A Remarkable Legacy

Twenty Years of Incentivizing Public-Private Partnerships – The Wyoming State Matching Program

The Wyoming state matching program began 20 years ago with the intent of incentivizing donors to the University of Wyoming. It was expanded from matching endowments to athletics facilities and then to academic facilities. The overwhelming success of the program is a testament to the dedicated investment of our state leadership and the enthusiastic devotion of UW supporters.

It was in 2001 that the Wyoming Legislature established the University Endowment Challenge Program (W.S. 21-16-903), while the Athletics Challenge Matching Program (W.S. 21-16-1003) was established in 2003 and the Academic Challenge Facilities Matching Program (W.S. 21-16-1403) in 2005.

Today, the extraordinary University Endowment Challenge Program, Athletics Challenge Matching Program, and Academic Facilities Challenge Matching Program have provided more than \$222 million in matching funds over the past 20 years—funds that have encouraged donors to partner with the State of Wyoming to support the future of our state and our

nation. The partnership among the University of Wyoming, State of Wyoming leadership, and donors has had a deep and unparalleled impact on University of Wyoming students, faculty, and staff and the programs and facilities that support them.

This program continues to fulfill its promise—it is designed to leverage the generosity of donors and to encourage new levels of giving by creating incentives to invest in UW and its academic, athletic, and facility priorities. It is not often that an investment yields a 100 percent return, but that’s exactly what happens with this program—eligible endowment gifts of \$50,000 or more and facility gifts of \$25,000 or more are doubled by the State of Wyoming. Since its very beginning, this public-private partnership has surpassed even our greatest expectations.

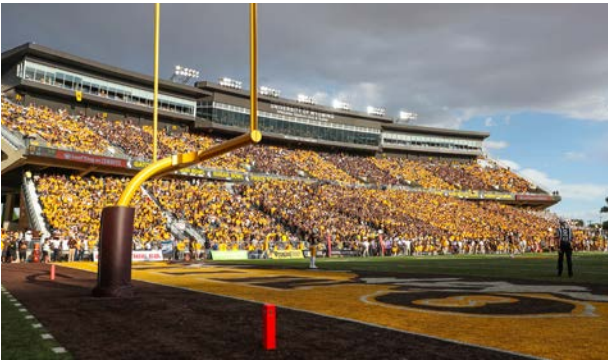

STUDENT SUPPORT

In 1992, John L. Kemmerer wanted to help students from the town that bears his name, and so he established a scholarship. In 2004, the **Kemmerer Family Foundation** expanded that scholarship, the impact of which was doubled by the state matching program.

ATHLETICS
FACILITIES

Many dramatic renovations to the University of Wyoming's **War Memorial Stadium** took place between 2001 and 2010. These included a new artificial turf with a new name—Jonah Field—and the new Wildcatter Stadium Club and Suites, as well as improvements to the scoreboard, bleachers, amenities, and ADA compliance. Parts of these renovations were supported by donors and the state matching program.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES

In 2009, the University of Wyoming cut the ribbon on the **Cheney International Center**, which was created through a gift of Vice President Dick and Dr. Lynne Cheney and state matching. The center is the home to internationalization at UW—the Global Engagement Office, International Students and Scholars, Education Abroad, and the English Language Center. The Cheneys also established a study-abroad scholarship that benefitted 2,115 students in its first ten years.

FACILITIES

The **William N. Brimmer Legal Education Center** was funded with \$2.25 million in private support from 48 donors and \$2.25 million in state matching funds. The center provides law students a venue in which to simulate trial experiences while also providing a functional courtroom for the Wyoming Second Judicial District, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit, and the Wyoming Supreme Court.

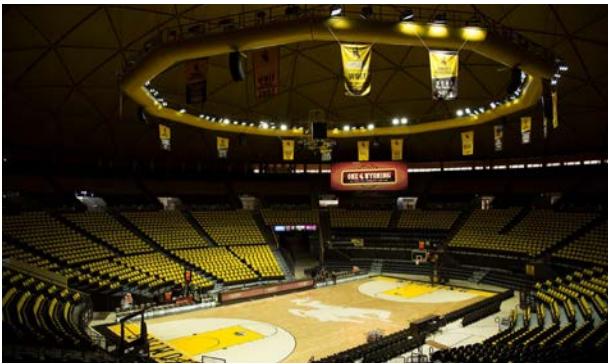
The **F.E. "Tut" and V. Diane Ellis President's Endowed Scholarship** supports the best and brightest Wyoming students seeking engineering degrees at UW. The \$1 million gift from the Ellis Family Foundation, which was doubled to \$2 million by the state matching program, supports the position. Previously, the foundation had established a scholarship that supports future petroleum engineers. The Ellis Family Foundation was established by UW alums Tut and Diane Ellis.



HIGHLIGHTS OF 20 YEARS OF STATE MATCH

FACULTY SUPPORT

UW's **Dr. Mohammad Piri**—the Wyoming Excellence Chair in Petroleum Engineering, the Thomas and Shelley Botts Endowed Chair in Unconventional Reservoirs, and the Alchemy Sciences Endowed Chair in Petroleum Engineering—is bridging the gaps in scientific knowledge needed to enhance oil and gas recovery from conventional and unconventional reservoirs. This work takes place in the Center of Innovation for Flow through Porous Media, one of the most advanced experimental oil and gas research facilities in the world, which is housed in UW's state-of-the-art High Bay Research Facility. State matching has contributed to both Dr. Piri's work and the facilities that make it possible.



ATHLETICS
FACILITIES

The **Arena-Auditorium**, or the Dome of Doom, was rededicated in 2017 after extensive donor- and state-funded renovations. The upgrades included a new Grand Entryway with an 18-foot Kenny Sailors statue, new electronic signage and video boards, new concessions areas, history and Hall of Fame exhibits, new Cowboys and Cowgirls locker rooms, new sports conditioning and sports medicine areas, and much more to support Wyoming athletics.

STUDENT SUPPORT

The **Marna M. Kuehne Foundation Scholarship** is among the suite of funds and services at the University of Wyoming that support our veterans. The state-matched fund supports undergraduate and graduate students who are disabled veterans—the mission of the Marna M. Kuehne Foundation. They also support UW veteran students through the veterans center.



ATHLETICS
FACILITIES

The Rochelle Athletics Center was expanded to include the **Mick and Susie McMurry High Altitude Performance Center**. A total of 136 donors helped fund the project with more than \$24 million, and \$20 million came from state matching. It included a new weight room, new recovery pools, a full-service kitchen, remodeled locker rooms, a sports medicine biomechanics lab, an academic center, a computer lab, coaches offices, and a theater-style meeting room.

FACULTY SUPPORT

The state-matched **Harry C. Vaughan Professorship in Astronomy** was created by a gift from the Windy Ridge Foundation to recruit and retain top faculty in astronomy at UW. The Windy Ridge Foundation was created by Dr. Harry C. Vaughan, Iowa State professor of meteorology who retired to Laramie. This support, along with state matching funds, also transformed the UW Planetarium in 2014.

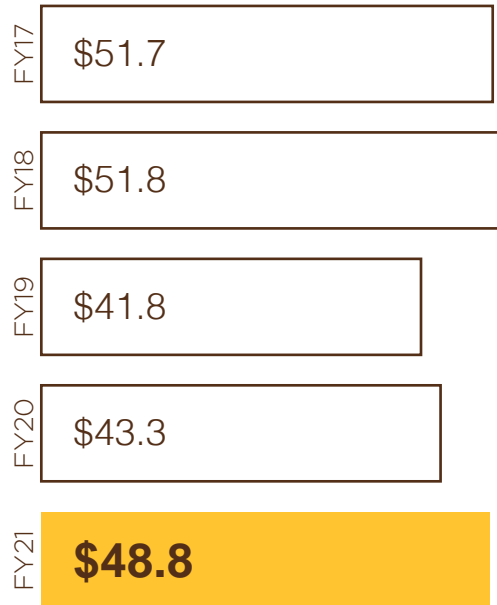

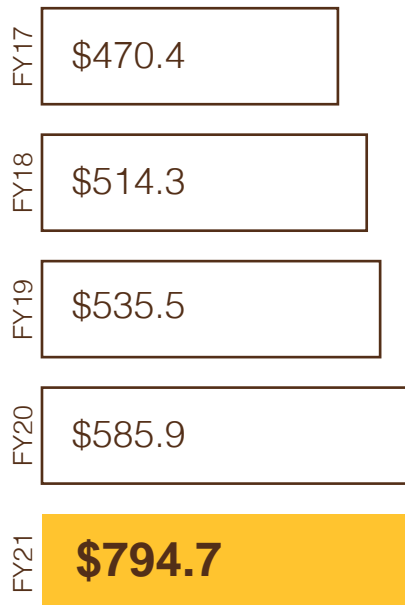

IN MILLIONS

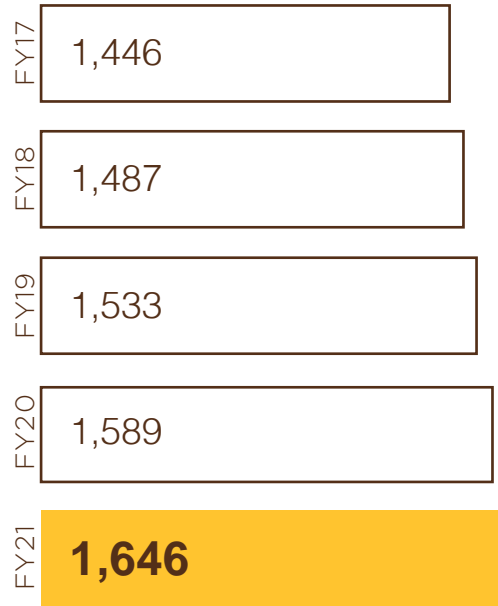
